Imagine Your Parks₁



- Approved by voters in 2004
- 20-year, \$70.5M program
- Shift to Community Park model

 i.e., larger, convenient, diverse
 facilities, serve all ages
- In the past 9 years, fulfilled program's goal of developing 12 new community parks
- Capital improvements from the plan are now largely complete



80% of households visited BREC parks in the past year

- Parks visited most often:
 - City-Brooks Community Park
 - Independence Community Park
 - North Sherwood Community Park
 - Highland Community Park
 - Jackson Community Park
 - Forest Community Park

85% rate the physical condition of parks as good or excellent





21% of households have participated in BREC recreation programs.

Of those households, 95% rate the quality of the programs as good or excellent.





Over half of respondents identified health and fitness as the most significant benefits of BREC parks, trails, recreation facilities, programs, and services.

Nearly a third responded that these facilities and services make the Parish a more desirable place to live.





Highest Priority Parks and Facilities

- Walking and Biking Trails (28%)
- Neighborhood Parks (27%)
- Playground Areas (21%)
- Fitness and Exercise Facilities (19%)
- Family Picnic Areas (17%)





Highest Priority Programs

- Youth Learn to Swim (16%)
- Water Fitness Programs (14%)
- Cultural Special Events (14%)
- Adult Continuing Education Programs (12%)
- Indoor Space for Small Events (12%)





Highest Priority Actions

- Improve existing neighborhood parks (34%)
- Improve trails that connect parks (25%)
- Develop new outdoor swim pools/family aquatic centers (20%)
- Develop new trails that connect parks (15%)
- Improve existing athletic fields / Purchase land to preserve natural areas (14%)



Events are good for enlivening parks






Partnerships

- adult programs needed (not just for seniors)

Make people more aware of BREC facilities and programs









Potential Strategic Directions



- Raise the standard for key recreation facilities (e.g., rec centers, community playgrounds).
- Improve connections to, within, and between existing parks (e.g., trails, sidewalks).
- Continue innovation in facilities and programming (e.g., zip-lining, adventure racing).

Potential Strategic Directions



- Develop new parks and facilities to serve growing areas of the parish.
- Take advantage of the Parish's natural resources and expand conservation- and water-oriented recreation
- Determine how to better work with partners to achieve common goals, while filling gaps in recreational opportunities.
- Continue to make the best use of tax payer dollars.

Fiscal Context



- Imagine Your Parks was funded by a separate 20-year bond that was approved by voters in 2004
 - Expanded recreational opportunities for residents, but also expanded maintenance requirements
 - Additional funding for maintenance will end in 2024
- Costs of doing business have increased and continue to increase








2004 Funding Review








BREC's 2013 Budget Revenue

Cost Recovery Targets



Cost recovery targets should reflect degree to which program area provides a public v. private good.

Broad Public Benefit



| Category | Description | Cost Recovery | Subsidy |
|--------------------|---|------------------|------------------|
| Core- Essential | Part of the organizational mission Serves a majority of the community "BREC must offer this program." | None to moderate | High to complete |
| Important | Important to the community Serves large portions of the community "BREC should offer this program." | Moderate | Moderate |
| Value- Added | Enhanced community offerings Serves niche groups "It would be nice if BREC offered this program." | High to complete | Little to none |
